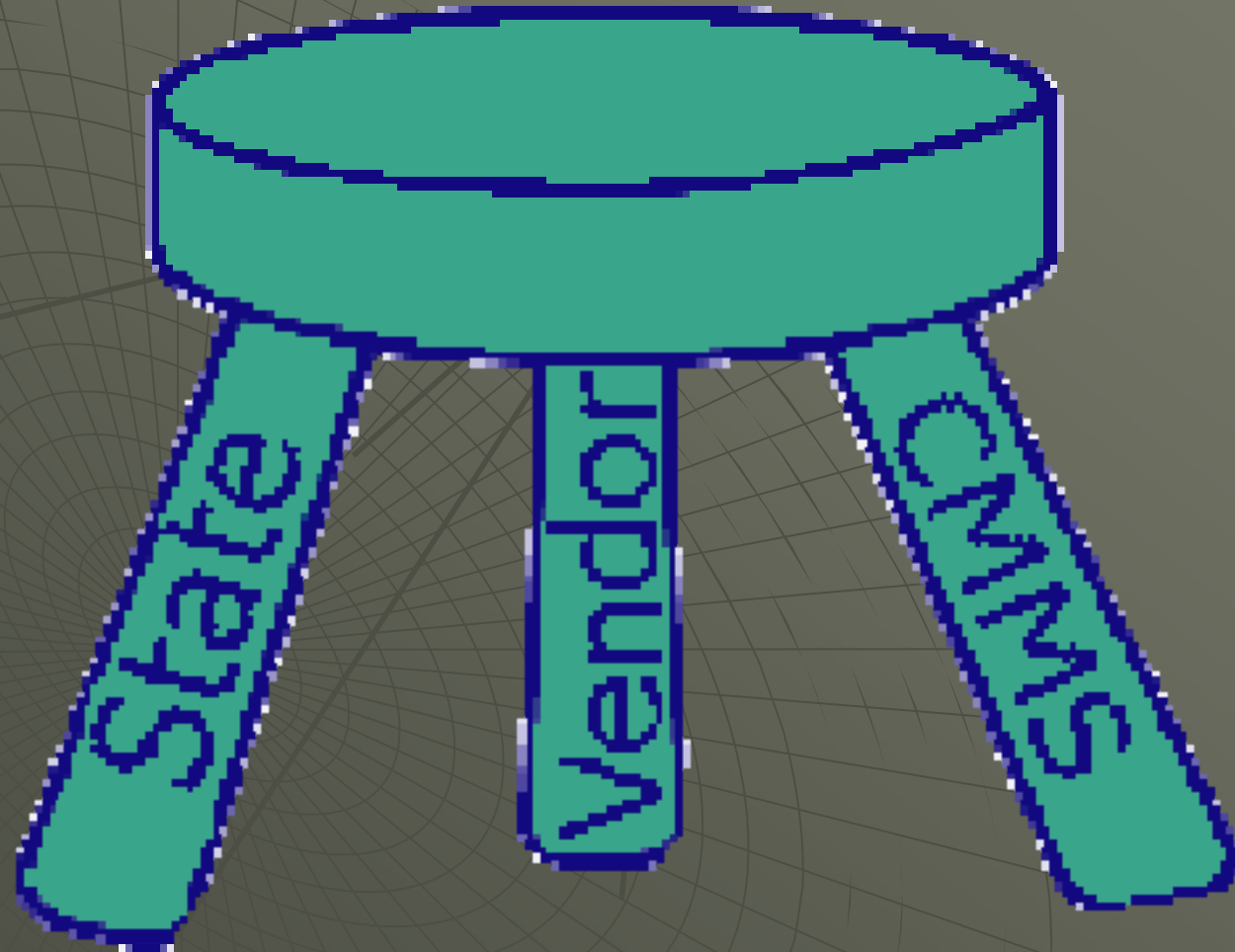
Objectives

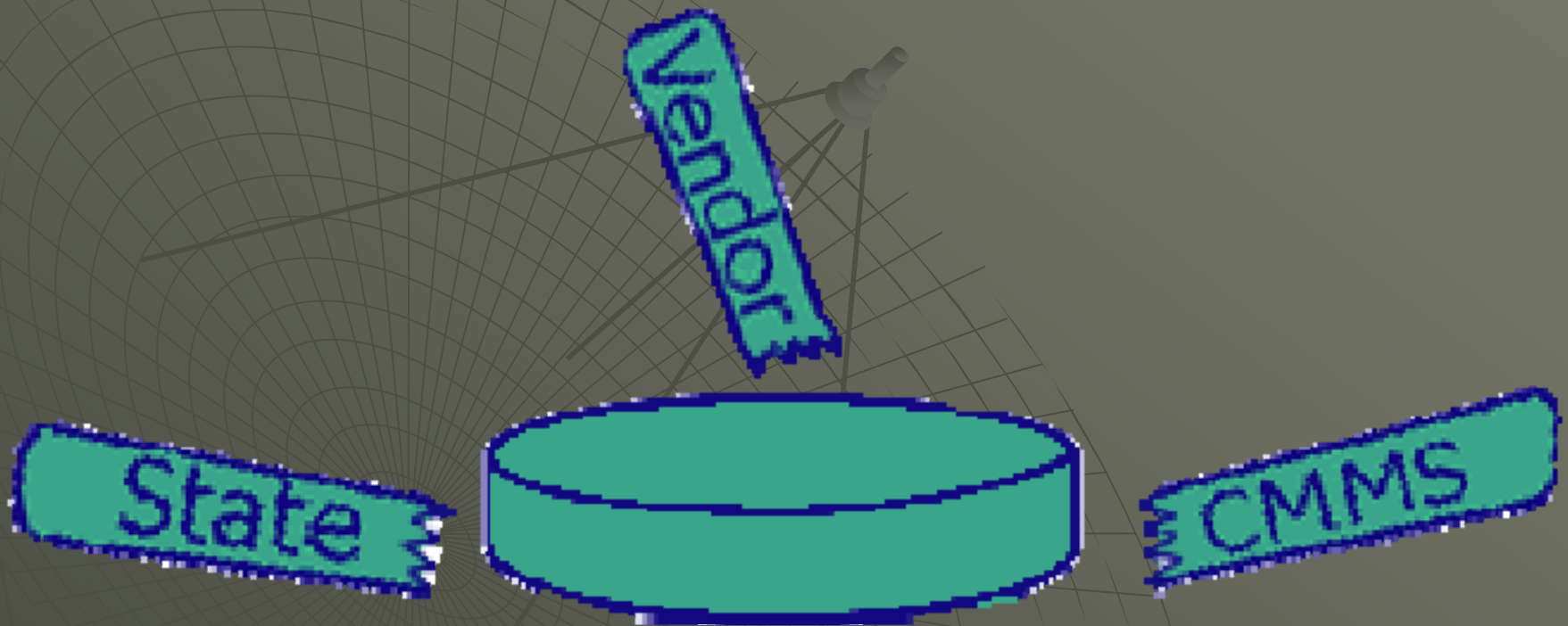
U.S. Workforce Statistics

- ◆ 45% of public employees in the U.S. will be at retirement age within the next 5 years
- ◆ 46% of government employees in the U.S. are 45 years old or older
- ◆ The proportion of older workers is expected to increase an average of 4% per year until 2015
